

Projects and Programs

Island County No Shooting Zone Petition Ordinance

This ordinance was defeated! Big thanks to Whidbey Island hunters and shooters who attended commission meetings and testified against it.

Thurston County Marine Shoreline No Shooting Zone Ordinance

A homeowner reported a Henderson Inlet waterfowl hunting incident to the County Sheriff and the **WDFW**, and he contacted the commissioners. **WWA** is likely to meet with the homeowner to better understand the situation.

Willapa National Wildlife Refuge and Eelgrass

(Pacific County)

We finally received detailed waterfowl count data from the **US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS).** We are now tabulating all the data to get a sense of waterfowl trends in Willapa Bay. We are reviewing a basic carrying capacity study provided by the commercial shellfish growers and continue to push for protections of eelgrass such that waterfowl numbers are not significantly impacted. It also appears some eelgrass monitoring will be conducted to help verify current conditions. Overall, **WWA** is still working toward an **acreage limit** on the spraying of eelgrass with the herbicide Imazamox, on commercial clam beds.

Willapa Refuge Porter Unit Dikes are scheduled for removal on the next unit this summer.

In regard to Willapa Refuge dike removal, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) sent our complaint to the USFWS for a response. After filing a freedom of information (FOIA) request and waiting 90 days, WWA finally received the USFWS response, which we find out was completed by the Refuge management. So, we have the same folks who perpetrated the dike removal plan, writing the defense of the plan, instead of an independent review of said plans by the OIG. And what do you know...the response says they did everything just fine, and they consider the case closed now. WWA is conducting a detailed review of the USFWS responses and based on results will decide whether to file suit against the USFWS for their lack of due process procedures during the Willapa NWR Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP).

Leque Island

(Snohomish/Island County)

WWA, Juniper Beach Water District, and the Snohomish County Farm Bureau met in Seattle with the U.S. EPA, Ducks Unlimited, and Pacific Groundwater Group (PGG), to discuss the PGG Leque Island restoration groundwater impact model report. Two representatives of the Recreation and Conservation Office (aka, the salmon recovery funding board) were also present. The DU/WDFW groundwater study was forwarded by U.S. EPA Seattle for technical review by a Ph.D. hydrogeologist at U.S. EPA in Cincinnati. Conclusions of the groundwater study were that even though salt-infused groundwater would flow into the sole source drinking water aquifer, it would not flow far enough west to reach current drinking water wells. Both the WWA and the Juniper Beach Water District have further concerns regarding impacts to the drinking water of northeast Camano Island, particularly in light of another planned restoration at the farm fields near Terry's Corner on Camano Island. This proposed project would put salt water on both sides of the current freshwater aquifer. We are now awaiting the study review from Cincinnati.

Projects and Programs - Continued

Heritage Lands

(Statewide)

Folks, this is a future for public hunting and fishing access. The USFWS, WDFW, and other agencies are dropping out of the public access and lands management scene. Restoration and conservation (even wetland mitigation) all are keeping most hunting off of the restored and "conserved" lands. If we want to have some public hunting lands we need to take the bull by the horns and manage it ourselves.

Are you interested in helping to preserve farmland for waterfowl and hunting into the future?

Imagine thousands of acres of farmland statewide, managed for farming and public access, by a hunter's non-profit Organization, all paying for itself through the lease of the land for farming.

A waterfowl hunting access program that pays for itself, managed by waterfowl hunters and farmers!



Spring Migration in Progress

I live a few miles inland from Puget Sound, but still west of I-5. Over the past couple weeks I have noticed a good number of ducks and geese flying high over my home at night. It is especially noticeable on cool clear windless nights. Snow geese, Canada geese, and widgeon seem to be the most vocal, but I occasionally hear a mallard quacking as it flies. Along with my fruit trees budding over the past week and the ornamental cherry trees blossoming, I believe Spring is springing upon us.

Snow Goose Transmitters

The **WDFW** implanted satellite transmitters into 10 snow geese this winter. We will be tracking these geese over the winter (see News for the Flock later in this month's newsletter for the most recent map) and through the next couple years. **WDFW** has asked if **WWA** would provide funding for some of the up to 10 more transmitter they hope to put out next year. One of the study goals is to track snow goose dispersal within Washington state and within the Fraser River Delta in Canada. With flocks of snow geese showing up in Tri-Cities, and many other Washington locations, it will be interesting to see how they get there. Do they all come here to the Skagit first and then disperse? So stay-tuned and watch for the maps to learn more about our snow goose populations.

Samish Unit

Some new blinds have already been built by WDFW and WWA will be building at least two more on April 13th (Work Party!!!). The goal is to spread hunters out a bit, and reduce overcrowding on weekend mornings. Watch for more information at the Samish Unit reader board next season. We are looking for solutions that reduce hunter conflicts, increase the quality of the hunt a bit and don't contribute to additional enforcement effort. Let us know if you have ideas.

Calling Lessons

Nick Handley will be at our chapter meeting on the 9th of April to relay his experience providing duck calling and outdoor instruction for 2nd through 6th graders from Clear Lake Elementary. Join us and give Nick some thanks. The class went great! We had 20 kids participate, about half of whom had ties to the outdoor world, and the others were very new to the outdoor world — five of which were girls! We discussed ethics, the importance of conservation efforts, bird identification, and of course how to run a duck call. Some of the kids sounded great and others just wanted to make noise. All the kids where engaged and wanted to get involved. The "Visions" Program at Clear Lake School is

dedicated to teaching kids the fundamentals with a fun hands-on approach. Everyone enjoyed themselves, and we would like to offer the class again next year.

Waterfowling Museum Anyone?

WWA-NW member Art Kendall has begun a process to try and develop a waterfowling museum in the Skagit Valley. Goal is to provide a place to preserve the rich waterfowling heritage of the area and display waterfowling art, decoys, and area history. HSUS Sets Their Sights on Kohl's Department Stores

The **Humane Society of the United States (HSUS)** is teaming up with the granddaughter of the founder of Kohl's department stores, Dr. Jana Kohl, to push for a "fur-free environment." **HSUS** submitted a proposal for their upcoming shareholder meeting asking Kohl's to create a policy clearly stating the company's future plans for banning animal fur sales. **HSUS** claims that such a policy would lead the company away from the inhumane treatment of animals killed for their fur. **HSUS** has fought many retail clothing stores with their "Fur-Free Campaign" that pushes department stores and others to end the use of fur in their clothing lines, instead pushing the use of synthetic materials. According to Dr. Jana Kohl, "it brings me great sadness that my family name is associated with the fur business, an industry marked by such barbaric cruelty against animals that it's nothing short of legalized torture." Kohl's, a national department store chain headquartered in Wisconsin, is a leading family-focused, value-oriented, and specialty department store. **HSUS**, which opposes hunting and trapping, animal agriculture, and most uses of animals, are number one on the **U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance "Dirty Dozen" list.**

School Animal Rights Propaganda Bill Introduced in Connecticut

In addition to the deluge of gun control legislation being deliberated in the Connecticut General Assembly, an equally insidious proposal has quietly been introduced into the state's House of Representatives. House Bill 5024 "permits local or regional boards of education to offer humane education courses and use curriculum's developed by the **Humane Society, ASPCA** or other animal welfare organizations."

Allowing animal rights groups such as the **Humane Society of the United States (HSUS)** or the **ASPCA** to have direct access to children during their formative years may ensure a future adult population that will be pre-disposed to oppose legitimate uses of animals including livestock farming, veterinary practices, lifesaving research on animals, and of course, hunting, trapping and fishing. The bill is all the more dangerous given how the public confuses **HSUS** with the good work accomplished by many local humane societies. **HSUS'** main focus is to eliminate the use of animals in society. The **ASPCA**, which is involved in animal shelters, advocates for over-reaching bills that would eliminate law abiding dog breeders, opposes trapping, and many forms of hunting.

While not the first time such a bill has been introduced it should serve as a wakeup call for sportsmen who, while understandably concerned about gun control legislation, also need to keep a watchful eye on bills that could change the outdoor heritage culture of the United States for future generations.

HSUS Sues to Overturn Wolf Delisting

On Tuesday, February 12th, the **Humane Society of the United States (HSUS)** and other animal rights organizations filed a lawsuit against the **U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS)** to overturn the removal of the Western Great Lakes region wolves from listing under the **Endangered Species Act (ESA)**. The lawsuit was filed in the U.S. District Court in Washington D.C. Wolves in the Western Great Lakes region, which consists of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, and parts of bordering states, were removed from **ESA** protection in January of 2012 after exceeding population recovery goals. This allowed state wildlife professionals to manage exploding wolf populations that have become a danger to livestock, pets, and wildlife populations. If successful, the lawsuit would unnecessarily return wolves in the region to federal protection under the **ESA**, a move that would again prohibit state wildlife agencies from managing them.

"This lawsuit undermines both the **ESA** and the **North American Model of Wildlife Conservation,"** said Jeremy Rine, **U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance** In-House Counsel. "Wolves in this region have far exceeded the population recovery goals established and should be managed by the individual state wildlife agencies to ensure sustainable populations and public safety. This is just another example of the animal rights lobby trying to abuse the **ESA** which was never intended to permanently protect species that have recovered." Joining **HSUS** in filing the lawsuit are **Born Free USA**, **Help Our Wolves Live**, and **Friends of Animals and Their Environment**.

USSAF and Wolves: The U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance Foundation (USSAF) and its partners have been on the front lines working to ensure that wolves in the Western Great Lakes region were removed from the ESA and rightfully returned to state management. In 2010, USSAF helped initiate the delisting by threatening to sue the Service if it did not start the delisting process. USSAF also represented sportsmen in lawsuits by HSUS to overturn previous delisting attempts. Those cases were decided on legal technicalities that were not based on whether or not wolves were recovered. Additionally, USSAF represented sportsmen in a lawsuit in Wisconsin challenging portions of the state's wolf hunting season.
