### **Projects and Programs**

### **Duck Stamp Program**

### Willapa National Wildlife Refuge and Eelgrass

(Pacific County)

We finally received detailed waterfowl count data from the **US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS).** We are now tabulating all the data to get a sense of waterfowl trends in Willapa Bay. We are reviewing a basic carrying capacity study provided by the commercial shellfish growers and continue to push for protections of eelgrass such that waterfowl numbers are not significantly impacted. It also appears some eelgrass monitoring will be conducted to help verify current conditions. Overall, **WWA** is still working toward an **acreage limit** on the spraying of eelgrass with the herbicide Imazamox, on commercial clam beds.

#### Willapa Refuge Porter Unit Dikes are scheduled for removal on the next unit this summer.

In regard to Willapa Refuge dike removal, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) sent our complaint to the USFWS for a response. After filing a freedom of information (FOIA) request and waiting 90 days, WWA finally received the USFWS response, which we find out was completed by USFWS. So, we have the same folks who perpetrated the dike removal plan, writing the defense of the plan, instead of an independent review of said plans by the OIG. And what do you know...the response says they did everything just fine, and they consider the case closed now. WWA is conducting a detailed review of the USFWS responses and based on results will decide whether to file suit against the USFWS for their lack of due process procedures during the Willapa NWR Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP) process.

### **Leque Island**

(Snohomish/Island County)

WWA, Juniper Beach Water District, and the Snohomish County Farm Bureau met in Seattle with the U.S. EPA, Ducks Unlimited, and Pacific Groundwater Group (PGG), to discuss the PGG Leque Island restoration groundwater impact model report. Two representatives of the Recreation and Conservation Office [aka, the salmon recovery funding (SRF) board] were also present. The DU/WDFW groundwater study was forwarded by U.S. EPA Seattle for technical review by a Ph.D., hydrogeologist at U.S. EPA in Cincinnati. Conclusions of the groundwater study were that even though salt-infused groundwater would flow into the sole source drinking water aquifer, it would not flow far enough west to reach current drinking water wells. Both the WWA and the Juniper Beach Water District have further concerns regarding impacts to the drinking water of northeast Camano Island, particularly in light of another planned restoration at the farm fields near Terry's Corner on Camano Island. This proposed project would put salt water on both sides of the current freshwater aquifer. We are now awaiting the study review from Cincinnati.





### **Projects and Programs - Continued**

### **Heritage Lands**

(Statewide)

Folks, this is a future for public hunting and fishing access. The USFWS, WDFW, and other agencies are dropping out of the public access and lands management scene. Restoration and conservation (even wetland mitigation) all are keeping most hunting off of the restored and "conserved" lands. If we want to have some public hunting lands we need to take the bull by the horns and manage it ourselves.

### Are you interested in helping to preserve farmland for waterfowl and hunting into the future?

Imagine thousands of acres of farmland statewide, managed for farming and public access, by a hunter's non-profit Organization, all paying for itself through the lease of the land for farming.

#### **It's called Heritage Lands**

**WWA** wants to use **private dollars**, to establish this program, then after established, not only will it pay for itself, as it grows it will pay for its own expansion, including additional opportunities to lease land for waterfowl plantings and hunting access on other private lands. Why private dollars? Because most of the available public grant money comes with requirements for restoration. We are trying to save the farmland, not restore it!

A waterfowl hunting access program that pays for itself, managed by waterfowl hunters and farmers! It is a powerful match up.

The only good thing is that the moisture may promote more vegetation around the pond edges and improve the ability to have some more cover during hunting season.



#### **Get Out And Vote**



Our next meeting is July 9<sup>th</sup>. We are working on getting a dog trainer or decoy carver as our guest, but neither has been confirmed at this time. **Keep an eye on your email and the members web-site announcements for NW-Chapter Meeting News** as we get closer to the meeting date.

#### **WDFW Plantings and Volunteer Support**

**Samish Unit** planting was finished last week with about 30 acres of corn and some barley in new locations. **Leque Island** planting finished with about 8 acres of corn and 45+ acres of barley.

On the **Farmed Island Unit** about 15 acres of grain has been planted, and they are working on the Proso and wild millet. So far **WDFW** has not requested any additional help getting the seed over to the **Farmed Island** as they have been doing small batches themselves. **Volunteers** may be needed for dike top clearing and brush removal but that will come later in the summer after the planting is completed.

#### Annual Youth Hunt

WWA-NW has youth hunt locations and plans in place, and we are now seeking folks for about 12 different hunt times during the Youth Hunt Weekend September 21 and 22. We also need some volunteers that weekend to help get folks into the blinds and provide some pointers, if requested by the hunters. Let's get the word out so we can fill these blinds. If we get more than 12 hunting groups, we can make more time slots available in the existing blinds and are continuing to work toward new hunt areas as well.

#### State Calling Contest at Cabela's-Lacey

#### **Leque Island Groundwater**

**WWA** and friends met with the **U.S. EPA** regarding the **WDFW** groundwater study at **Leque Island**. The **U.S. EPA** hydrogeologist reviewed the groundwater study report and essentially **found it to be acceptable**.

However we found out he had not reviewed our combined comments in regard to their potential impact on the study results. So, U.S. EPA is now supposed to be reviewing those comments and providing some form of response and a final decision on whether the restoration is likely to impact drinking water underlying Camano Island.

Initially we were told a final decision would be coming within a week of our meeting, but we pointed out that would mean they had already come to a conclusion without reviewing our comments...so now the deadline is farther out, with no set date.

We have also conducted a **Freedom of Information Act (FOIA)** request to get the agency emails regarding the **U.S. EPA** groundwater study review as they have had two or three meetings/teleconferences which we were not informed about, nor invited to attend.



- 2. MagPul Industries has already started making Polymer magazines (PMAGs) outside of Colorado and has vowed to remove all of its manufacturing facilities from Colorado if the law is not changed.
- 3. Lawrence Tool & Molding will soon follow MagPul and move to either Wyoming or Montana.

For its part, **Magpul** is donating the proceeds of the sale of these special magazines to a lawsuit seeking to overturn the Colorado state law banning high-capacity magazines. A group of 54 Colorado sheriffs filed a federal lawsuit in May in an effort to overturn the gun magazine law and another law requiring universal background checks for gun buyers. The sheriffs say the laws are unconstitutional.

## First Inslee Appointment to Fish and Wildlife Commission

OLYMPIA - Jay Holzmiller, a longtime resident of Anatone in Asotin County, has been appointed by Gov. Jay Inslee to an Eastern Washington position on the Washington Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) Commission.

**Holzmiller,** 56, is an equipment operator for the **Asotin County Public Works Department** who also raises livestock at his home in Anatone. For nearly two decades he has been involved in conservation, land use, and the preservation of fish and wildlife. He is a longtime hunter and a 1975 graduate of Anatone High School.

The commission is a nine-member citizen panel that sets policy for **WDFW**. Members are appointed by the governor to six-year terms and are subject to state Senate confirmation. Three members must reside in Eastern Washington, three in Western Washington, and three may live anywhere in the state. No two members may live in the same county.

"Jay's knowledge and experience will enable him to make a significant contribution to the commission as it promotes the conservation of fish and wildlife and the economic vitality of local communities that depend on outdoor-related commerce and recreation," **Inslee** said.

"We are very pleased to welcome **Jay** to the Commission, and we look forward to benefitting from his skills and perspectives," said **Miranda Wecker**, Commission chair.

Holzmiller has been a member of the Asotin County Conservation District, the Snake River Salmon Recovery Board, and the Asotin County Shorelines Committee. He helped form the Blue Mountain Fire District and has served the district as a volunteer firefighter. In addition, he chaired the committee that developed the Community Wildfire Protection Plan for Asotin, Garfield and Columbia counties.

The Governor appointed **Holzmiller** to succeed **Chuck Perry of Moses Lake**, whose term expired.

### Rare Baikal Teal spotted in Blue Mountain Area

Radd Icenoggle's Sunday night search for a screech owl turned into something far more after spotting a bird species never seen before in Montana. "I had driven out in the Blue Mountain area after getting a report of a screech owl there," Icenoggle said. "I was looking down in this ditch and said to myself, 'Man, that's an odd-looking duck.' " One close look later and Icenoggle knew he was about to make history. "As soon as I looked at it closer, I knew right away it was a Baikal teal," he said.

"There have only been 11 or 12 of them spotted in the continental U.S. south of Alaska." It had never been seen before in Montana.

The Baikal teal is a dabbler that's sometimes called a squawk duck. It measures between 15 and 17 inches long and up to 15 inches tall. It's slightly larger than the common teal. The male is unmistakable, with its striking green nape and its long-dropping dark scapular feathers. It breeds in eastern Russia and winters in eastern Asia.

No one can be sure how it ended up in Montana. Another avid birder **Bob Danley** thinks the high winds that some call the **Siberian Express** may be

the cause of this good fortune for local birding enthusiasts. "This animal is incredible," he said. "It has such stunning plumage, and it's so very rare for this part of the world. For the birding community, this is a very big deal."

**Icenoggle** will add his photographs of the bird to a short narrative he plans to write about the discovery to create a report he'll present to the state Audubon rare bird committee. "It will be a first state record of the Baikal teal if it sticks," he said. **Icenoggle** has spotted and identified about 1,200 birds in the 22 years that he's been an avid birder.

### Women's workshop offers instruction on fishing, hunting, outdoor skills

OLYMPIA - Women can learn the basics of fishing, hunting, and other outdoor skills at a weekend workshop September, 13-15 that includes sessions led by Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) experts and other certified instructors. The annual workshop at Camp Waskowitz in North Bend, WA., is coordinated by Washington Outdoor Women (WOW), a non-profit program dedicated to teaching women outdoor skills and natural resource stewardship. WOW, now in its 16th year, is an educational outreach program of the Washington Wildlife Federation.

Instructors will offer 20 different classes on outdoor skills such as archery, freshwater fishing, fly fishing, kayaking, big-game hunting, wild edibles, map and compass reading, wilderness First Aid, survival skills, outdoor photography and more. Several **WDFW** staff members serve as volunteer instructors for the event, including **biologists Laura Till and Susan Cierebiej**, who teach map and compass skills, and **Stacie Kelsey**, who teaches basic freshwater fishing. In all, 32 instructors volunteer their time and expertise at this WOW workshop to help women re-connect with the outdoors.

Workshop participants must be at least 18 years old and must have a current Washington recreational fishing license to participate in the fishing and fly-fishing sessions.

The workshop fee of \$250 includes the weekend's instruction, lodging, meals and use of all necessary equipment. Partial scholarships, provided by the **Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation**, are available for first-time participants. #### RECIPE OF THE MONTH

### **French Toast Casserole**

4 T unsalted butter, melted

¾ C packed brown sugar

1 loaf Brioche or Challah bread, sliced 1 ½" thick (about 1 ½#), French bread works well, too

8 large eggs, lightly beaten

1 C whole milk

1 T pure vanilla extract

½ t ground cinnamon (I prefer a lot more)

1/4 t ground ginger (substitute nutmeg if you don't have this, and lots of it)

1 pinch salt

½ cupped chopped pecans (I like about 1 cup)

confectioners sugar for topping accompaniment, and/or maple syrup

combine melted butter and brown sugar in 9" minimum glass baking dish

Arrange bread slices in dish

Whisk eggs, milk, vanilla, cinnamon, ginger (or nutmeg) and salt in bowl. Pour over bread, letting soak in. Top with pecans. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate 3 -12 hours.

Take baking dish out of refrigerator and let stand at room temperature 20 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Put dish in oven and bake until browned and set, approximately 30-45 minutes.

Remove from oven, let cool, sift with confectioner's sugar. Serve by self or topped with maple syrup.

### **U.S. District Court Dismisses Lawsuit to Ban Traditional Ammunition**

### From the National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF):

NEWTOWN, Conn. — The **U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia** today dismissed a lawsuit brought by the radical antihunting **Center for Biological Diversity (CBD)** and six other groups demanding the **Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)** ban traditional ammunition containing lead components.

Traditional ammunition represents 95 percent of the U.S. market and is the staple ammunition for target shooters, hunters and law enforcement, with more than 10 billion rounds sold annually.

**NSSF** filed a motion to dismiss the lawsuit last August. The court today agreed with **NSSF** that **EPA** does not have the authority to regulate traditional ammunition under the **Toxic Substances Control Act.** 

**EPA** had previously twice denied attempts by **CBD** to have the agency ban traditional ammunition, and the court had dismissed an earlier case brought by **CBD** seeking the same relief.

"We are gratified that the court has found this second frivolous lawsuit, which is essentially the same as the one dismissed last year, was equally without merit," said **Lawrence G. Keane**, senior vice president and general counsel for the **National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF)**, the trade association for the firearms and ammunition industry. "This was a waste of taxpayers' dollars and **EPA** resources spent in having to defend a baseless lawsuit."

**CBD's** serial petitioning of **EPA** and its repeated lawsuits were designed to cripple the shooting sports in America by banning the ammunition that millions of hunters and target shooters choose to use safely and responsibly.

"There is quite simply no sound science that shows the use of traditional ammunition has harmed wildlife populations or that it presents a health risk to humans who consume game taken with such ammunition," said Keane. "Banning traditional ammunition would cost tens of thousands of jobs in America and destroy wildlife conservation that is funded in part by an 11 percent excise tax on the sale of ammunition. The protection and management of wildlife is properly handled by the professional biologists in the state fish and game agencies, as it has been for over a hundred years.

In addition to NSSF, the National Rifle Association, Safari Club International and the Association of Battery Recyclers intervened in the case.

Organizations that joined CBD in its lawsuit were the Cascades Raptor Center of Oregon, the Loon Lake Loon Association of Washington, Preserve Our Wildlife of Florida, Tennessee Ornithological Society, Trumpeter Swan Society and Western Nebraska Resources Council.

NSSF was represented by Roger Martella and Christopher Bell from Sidley Austin.
