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

Hey Y'all:

A few evenings ago, just after the first rain storm of the summer, I stepped out to put my dogs in the kennel for the night. The wind was rustling though the tree leaves and there was a chill in the air. Thoughts of bird hunting immediately leapt to mind...

I have often wondered what it is about dropping barometric pressure, wind, rain, snow, and cold that makes my blood pressure rise and creates the associated urge to get outside. Seems like that would be a good research project, along with determining the odd genetic markers on a hunters DNA.

The **WWA** has been busy over the spring and summer.

- The **Moses Lake Chapter** has worked with **WDFW** to plant areas that will soon be flooded as part of an irrigation project, providing waterfowl and hunting habitat in central Washington, and continues to work with **WDFW** waterfowl biologists to monitor goose nesting.
- For nearly two (2) years, the **Tri-Cities Chapter** has been trying to get permission to build and maintain blinds on the U.S. Fish and Widlife's (USFWS) Burbank Slough area, but can't get the go ahead from the area
- The **NW Chapter** is planning for the youth hunt and beginning a new fight against the "Friends of Eide Road", a bird watching group trying to ban hunting on Leque Island, and who just approached the Juniper **Beach Water District** to try and help them save drinking water by saving **Leque Island**...that's a novel idea 10 years after the first fish restoration plan was presented, and now that the groundwater study has already been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), allowing fish restoration on the island and impact to the sole source aguifer.

The Yakima Chapter recently sponsored a youth trap shooting team.


- The **Whatcom Chapter** is right now conducting its annual hunter education class and continues to fund its annual scholarship.

Projects and Programs

WILLAPA NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE (NWR) AND EELGRASS

(Pacific County)

We finally received detailed waterfowl count data from the **US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS).** We are now tabulating all the data to get a sense of waterfowl trends in Willapa Bay. We are reviewing a basic carrying capacity study provided by the commercial shellfish growers and continue to push for protections of eelgrass such that waterfowl numbers are not significantly impacted. It also appears some eelgrass monitoring will be conducted to help verify current conditions. Overall, **WWA** is still working toward an **acreage limit** on the spraying of eelgrass with the herbicide Imazamox, on commercial clam beds.

Leveling of the Porter Unit Dikes has begun.

According to locals in Pacific County and recently reported sightings of two (2) large excavators and dump trucks on the Porter Point Unit Dike, the destruction of the **Porter Point Unit** Dike has begun.

After filing a complaint with the Office of Inspector General (OIG) for the Department of Interior regarding the lack of due process procedures during the Willapa NWR Comprehensive Conservation Plan (CCP) process, instead of an independent review by OIG, they sent our complaint to the USFWS for a response. After filing a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request and waiting 90 days, WWA finally received the USFWS response, which we find out was completed by the Refuge management. So, we have the same folks who perpetrated the dike removal plan, writing the defense of the plan, instead of an independent review of said plans by the OIG. And what do you know...the response says they did everything just fine, and they consider the case closed now. WWA is still conducting a detailed review of the USFWS responses and interviewing attorneys and based on results will decide whether to file suit against the USFWS.

LEQUE ISLAND

(Snohomish/Island County)

WWA, Juniper Beach Water District, and the Snohomish County Farm Bureau met in Seattle with the U.S. EPA, Ducks Unlimited, and Pacific Groundwater Group (PGG), to discuss the PGG Leque Island restoration groundwater impact model report. Two representatives of the Recreation and Conservation Office (aka, the Salmon Recovery Funding Board) were also present. The DU/WDFW groundwater study was forwarded by U.S. EPA Seattle for technical review by a Ph.D. hydrogeologist at U.S. EPA in Cincinnati. Conclusions of the groundwater study were that even though salt-infused groundwater would flow into the sole source drinking water aquifer, it would not flow far enough west to reach current drinking water wells. Both the WWA and the Juniper Beach Water District have further concerns regarding impacts to the drinking water of northeast Camano Island, particularly in light of another planned restoration at the farm fields near Terry's Corner on Camano Island. This proposed project would put salt water on both sides of the current freshwater aquifer. We are now awaiting the study review from Cincinnati.

HERITAGE LANDS

(Statewide)

Folks, this is a future for public hunting and fishing access. The USFWS, WDFW, and other agencies are dropping out of the public access and lands management scene. Restoration and conservation (even wetland mitigation) all are keeping most hunting off of the restored and "conserved" lands. If we want to have some public hunting lands we need to take the bull by the horns and manage it ourselves.

Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) Grant Update

Here is an update on the **ALEA Grant** project and includes a work party scheduled for later this year:



<u>Upland shrubs</u>: There is an approximately 25-30% survival of upland shrubs, this was based on 23.7% survival of shrubs on the uppermost row. The species appearing to have fared best include: rose, aspen, golden currant, mockorange, serviceberry, and hawthorn. However, all species have some plants that are surviving.

<u>Riparian shrubs</u>: These have an approximately 12.5% survival rate. 396 living plants (willow and dogwood) are

shown in map to the left. Additional mortality is likely to occur, but all mapped dots have a reasonable chance of survival.



"It's Here"





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KESSELRING'S GUN SHOP LOSES ITS FIREARMS LICENSE

For more than 65 years, Kesselring Gun Shop has sold firearms to the hunters, collectors and protectors among us. But starting October 1st, the family-owned shop will sell firearms no more.

Nobody will say why.

Don Kesselring, reached at his shop by phone, said he had made a deal with the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF). Part of the deal means not talking about why his business lost its license.

A spokesman for the ATF also refused to provide details about Kesselring's license.

Was the license surrendered or revoked? Bill Perkins from the Seattle office of the ATF won't say. A July 2nd post by the shop on its Facebook page said the business is being forced to surrender its license.

Don Kesselring said the business will continue to sell gun parts, clips, magazines and ammunition, while his brother, **Keith**, will sell firearms out of a pro shop at a shooting range in Burlington once it opens. **Kesselring Gun Shop** is also prevented from providing any gunsmithing services under the Agreement with **ATF**.

Law enforcement throughout Skagit County seemed surprised by the news. "I heard a rumor but I didn't believe it," said **Anacortes Police Chief Bonnie Bowers**. "Kesselrings has been there forever. It will be missed by all of us." She said the shop gave discounts to members of law enforcement, and many officers have also bought their off-duty weapons there.

When **Bowers** started at the **Anacortes Police Department**, officers carried a 9 mm Beretta handgun. "We transitioned to .40-caliber Glock handguns. We bought 18 new guns — all from Kesselring," **Bowers** said. **Sgt. Mike Moore** of the **Mount Vernon Police Department** said that like most police departments in the valley, Mount Vernon's buys most of its firearms from the manufacturer. The city buys "some ammo" but not much, he said, from Kesselring Gun Shop.

Doug Williams, a board member for the **Custer Sportsmans Club**, which has 2,500 members, said it will be hard to replace Kesselring Gun Shop as a local firearms dealer. "I've done business with them for two generations now, and it's a huge loss to the community," **Williams** said. "The other stores in the region will hopefully be able to pick up the slack and with any luck, Kesselrings will be reincarnated somehow."

The shop has until October 1st to sell its inventory. According to its Facebook page [Kesselring Gun Shop, Inc.], Browning rifles and shotguns are priced 15 percent off through September 15th, PLUS Browning is offered a tax relief discount of up to eight percent (8%).

Women's workshop offers instruction on fishing, hunting, outdoor skills

OLYMPIA - Women can learn the basics of fishing, hunting, and other outdoor skills at a weekend workshop <u>September 13-15</u> that includes sessions led by **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** experts and other certified instructors.

The annual workshop at Camp Waskowitz in North Bend, Wash., is coordinated by **Washington Outdoor Women** (WOW), a non-profit program dedicated to teaching women outdoor skills and natural resource stewardship. WOW, now in its 16th year, is an educational outreach program of the **Washington Wildlife Federation**.

Instructors will offer 20 different classes on outdoor skills such as archery, freshwater fishing, fly fishing, kayaking, big-game hunting, wild edibles, map and compass reading, wilderness First Aid, survival skills, outdoor photography and more. Several **WDFW** staff members serve as volunteer instructors for the event, including biologists **Laura Till** and **Susan Cierebiej**, who teach map and compass skills, and **Stacie Kelsey**, who teaches basic freshwater fishing. In all, 32 instructors volunteer their time and expertise at this WOW workshop to help women re-connect with the outdoors.

Workshop participants must be at least 18 years old and must have a current Washington recreational fishing license to participate in the fishing and fly-fishing sessions. The workshop fee of \$250 includes the weekend's instruction, lodging, meals and use of all necessary equipment. Partial scholarships, provided by the **Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation**, are available for first-time participants.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Duck Breast Rumaki

Ingredients:

2 boneless breast halves from 1 wild duck

1/2 C sake or dry sherry

1 T soy sauce

1T sesame oil

1t minced gingerroot

2 cloves garlic, pressed

8-10 slices, halved

16-20 canned whole water chestnuts

Directions:

Cut each breast half into 8-10 one-inch cubes

Blend sake, soy sauce, oil, ginger, garlic in a bowl

Add duck pieces & stir to coat. Marinate at room temp for 1 hour, or overnight in fridge

Place 1 duck chunk & water chestnut on a piece of back, wrap & secure with toothpick. Repeat for all ingredients
Heat oven 450 degrees. Arrange appetizers on broiler pan and cook until crisp—15-20 minutes or longer, turning once.

Options (1) roll in mixture of sevence papers & brown sugger (2) drive with backy and sprinkle with arreshed rod

Options: (1) roll in mixture of cayenne pepper & brown sugar; (2) drizzle with honey and sprinkle with crushed red peppers; (3) add matchstick pieces of Anaheim peppers while rolling up.

Fish and Wildlife Commission sets hunting seasons for migratory waterfowl

OLYMPIA - The Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission extended protections for giant Pacific octopuses in Puget Sound today by prohibiting the recreational harvest of the species at seven popular scuba diving sites from Whidbey Island to Tacoma.

The commission, a nine-member citizen panel appointed by the Governor to set policy for the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), also adopted 2013-14 hunting seasons for migratory waterfowl and approved several land acquisitions designed to conserve fish and wildlife habitat during the first day of its Aug. 2-3 meeting in Olympia.

With respect to waterfowl seasons the commission decided that

- General duck season will be open for 107 days from Oct. 12-16, 2013 and from Oct. 19-Jan. 26, 2014.
- A special youth hunting weekend will take place Sept. 21 and 22, 2013.
- See Summary on Page 28 of this Newsletter.

In addition, WDFW Wildlife Program staff members said surveys in the Pacific Flyway show duck populations are near long-term averages, while goose populations are generally at or above management goals.



The Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) has finalized a business plan for private land/public access program called

Heritage Lands.

The program idea came from a multi-stakeholder work group developing mitigation options for the farmland and public access losses resulting from fish restoration projects in the Lower Skagit and Stillaguamish River Deltas.

The goal of the program is for the Washington Waterfowl Association to:

- Furthers & ewn a limited assessed of fermiand in three or four different areas across the dishas.
- Preserve the farmland in perpetuity through sale of development rights and farming-related easements.
- Lease the land to farmers, supporting and promoting agricultural productivity, infrastructure, and crop rotation.
- Use lease fees to support property management, hunting and other public access, and lease of waterfowl hunting access to other private farmland in the region.
- Promote recreational access and wildlife habitat improvements that do not reduce long-term agricultural productivity.

Waterfowl I.D. isn't just important and ethical - IT'S THE LAW. You won't just get a fine if you shoot 3 Pintails, you will get a criminal citation, you may have to go before a judge to clear your record. Criminal citations on can complicate your life immensely, particularly with international travel.
