Hi All,

No matter how you look at it, waterfowl management has dropped off the list of priorities in Washington State. Overall the Pacific flyway numbers are pretty good for most waterfowl species so there is little incentive for waterfowl concerns to be more important than those for wolves or Chinook salmon. But for some of us, waterfowl are still a priority, and we would like to see additional research, management, and hunting opportunity.

For example, our **WWA Moses Lake Chapter** is doing good habitat work with their **WWA** tractor and with plantings in the **Gloyd Seeps Area** where additional water flow is planned. But, I think there are many opportunities to gain more waterfowl knowledge and provide additional waterfowl, waterfowl management, and waterfowl hunting.

To this end, I have contacted **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** waterfowl biologist **Erin Wehland** in Ephrata, to propose that the **WWA** form a statewide waterfowl technical council, with knowledgeable representatives from various regions across the state. The council should include folks interested in learning more about waterfowl in Washington, but also with a good understanding of waterfowl ecology in each region and a focus on increasing that understanding and providing increased hunting opportunity. The council would try to work with **WDFW** waterfowl management goals, but be independent in selecting council actions. If successful, **WWA** has already made some contact with other state waterfowl groups, and similar councils could communicate across multiple states. I'll be researching the feasibility of this waterfowl technical council and maybe putting together a draft charter over the coming months...stay tuned.

On another note, hopefully you're getting all the odd jobs done around your property so you can enjoy a turkey hunt in April. I managed to prune the fruit trees and get some of my hunting gear put away last weekend, but still

One is to provide 2 ADA (Americans with Disability Act) blinds at the Frenchman Restricted Access Area and one to plant nesting cover, habitat plots and food plots in the Gloyd Seeps Wildlife Area on the Middle Crab Creek project.

#### Nesting Tubes Are Ready To Go

Our Chapter commissioned a first round of 20 nesting tubes made, and they are all ready to go. A big thanks to Mr. Ray Harris' Tech Class for doing the metal work, and Mrs. Meggie Powell's SPED Class (both at Selah High School) for installing this year's Timothy hay in all 20 tubes.

These tubes were sold at the **Central Washington Sportsman's Show** last week, and we still have some extras for sale at \$50 each. These are high quality tubes, that are all metal (no wooden platform), so they should last for many seasons. They also have an adjustable height pole. We also will make any leftover tubes available to any **WWA** Members after the show. In the adjacent column are some helpful suggestions for using these, or any, nesting tubes.



#### **Some Good Nesting Tube Suggestions:**

- It is best to place nesting tube in an area that mallards are known to consistently nest with plenty of natural cover and water.
- The tube needs to be attached to the cradle with zip ties or metal wire.
- Bury steel tube 2-3 feet into solid ground above water in the nesting area.
- Tube should sit 3-4 feet above the water. The inner steel tube will adjust about 2 feet. If the water level changes in the wetland you are planting this structure, be sure there is water below the tube in the spring time when birds are using it.
- Place the side of the tube to the prevailing winds. You don't want the winds pushing through the tube.
- Once the tube is in place you need to fill inside of the tube about 2/3 full of timothy hay, slightly compacted. Mallards won't bring nesting material to the nest, you have to provide it. The hen will take it from there.
- If there is more than one nesting tube in the area you are placing this tube, make sure the nesting hens will not have direct visual sight of each other when they are in their tube.
- Tubes should be "planted" no later than early March, and Mid February is better.
- If you are going to change location of the tube wait until mid-summer to remove the tube. Every year just before nesting, the tube needs to be refilled with Timothy hay and checked for needed repairs.

Along with selling and promoting our nesting tubes, we also had a fundraising raffle for decoys; however, our favorite thing to do at the show was to get kids blowing duck & goose calls. Great fun!



Finally, we'll also see if we can book **Matt** back-to-back for our March meeting, where Matt has previously presented to "standing-room-only" on the topic of Turkey Hunting in Washington.

<u>Work Party News</u> – We'll also be planning some work parties in late February/early March to install some of the Wood Duck Nesting Boxes we put together at our last meeting. **Chapter Habitat Chairman, Bob Hazelbrook,** will be on hand to sign up volunteers and schedule outings in the **Snoqualmie Valley Area** for this same time period, and I will do the same for our "urban" placements in public parks in **Bellevue and Issaquah.** 

Eastern Washington Work Party — We will be doing our annual duck nest tube maintenance work party in Eastern Washington on the weekend of March 29 – 30<sup>th</sup>, meeting at 9:00 a.m., on that Saturday at **Leo Pfeifer's** Home Place in **Royal City**. This project takes place on public hunting grounds, so it you are looking to do some off season scouting or learn some new areas to hunt in E WA, don't miss this work party! Several of us have trailers at **Leo's Place** and can put you up. Again, let me know if you need lodging Saturday night.

In addition, many of us travel to the Tri-Cities that Saturday night to enjoy the **Richland Rod and Gun Club's** annual **Wild Game Banquet.** This event usually sells out, so if you want to go, be sure and contact **Leo at (425) 210-0321** to reserve tickets at \$20 each.

Master Hunter Points Opportunity to Help out the WA Pheasant Program — On Saturday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, at about 3 pm Centralia was hit with about 6" of snow. WDFW Game Farm Manager, Christopher White, and 3 volunteers knocked snow off of the major brooding areas and breeder pens until about 10 pm that night. This saved those critical

areas, however there was extensive damage to the outlying flight pens.

White says that they are in need of volunteer labor to put the farm back into working order. He is estimating that 48% of the bird rearing area is damaged and unusable.

The game farm is capable of supplying materials needed for the project. Volunteers with boots, rain gear and a good work ethic is all that is required. Flexible hours and dates are available for you to volunteer your time. Their core work hours are Monday-Friday 8 am to 5 pm. For those that cannot come during the week, **White** has scheduled three (3) weekend work parties that people can call and sign up for. This project will count toward master hunter hours if master hunters are interested.

The goal is to have the pens usable by mid—July. Work parties will be held on the weekends of March 1 & 2, March 8 & 9, and March 15 & 16. Volunteers should contact White at 360-807-6211 a day or two before coming down for the first time.

# PUBLIC-PRIVATE "BIG TENT COALITION" POINTS TO RECREATIONS'S ECONOMIC IMPACT

**OLYMPIA** - **Governor Jay Inslee** joined a group of businesses, non-profit groups and public agencies in Olympia this past week to highlight the message that outdoor recreation is an economic powerhouse that generates billions of dollars in business and tax revenue within Washington state.

Nearly three dozen Washington for-profit, non-profit and government organizations, known as **The Big Tent Outdoor Coalition**, held a meeting on Thursday, Feb. 13, in the lobby of the Natural Resources Building (NRB), 1111 Washington St. S.E., to focus on the importance of outdoor recreation. State agency participants include the **Departments of Fish & Wildlife**, **Department of Natural Resources**, the **Recreation and Conservation Office**, and the **State Parks and Recreation Commission**.

**Governor Inslee**, several legislators and state agency leaders shared their perspectives on the importance of the outdoor recreation sector to Washington's economy and quality of life. The Governor announced an initiative to promote the outdoor recreation and tourism sectors and to get more young people and families involved in outdoor activities.

Other activities included informational displays where the public and policymakers had the opportunity to visit with representatives of several recreation groups and agencies. Later, coalition members met with legislators before attending a reception at the Governor's Mansion, hosted by the Washington Wildlife and Recreation Coalition (WWRC).

"The Big Tent coalition is committed to raising public awareness about the incredible benefits that outdoor recreation brings to our state and its residents," said **Doug Levy**, a spokesman for the coalition who represents statewide parks, recreation and boating organizations. "The **Outdoor Industry Association** last year reported that Washington ranks sixth (6th) nationally in the number of outdoor recreation jobs, and that nearly 67% of Washingtonians participate in outdoor recreation each year."

The study concluded that \$22.5 billion is spent annually in Washington on outdoor recreation, supporting 227,600 jobs and generating \$1.6 billion in state and local tax revenue. Outdoor advocates said the impact is actually greater, since the study did not include equestrian, sailing and diving activities, all of which generate significant economic activity in the state. Jobs in the outdoor recreation sector include outdoor gear and apparel design and sales; lodging and transportation; guiding and outfitting services; and many more.

"We are delighted that **Governor Inslee** is highlighting the broad business and social benefits of outdoor recreation. The sector is among the state's biggest contributors to economic, community and personal health," said **Marc Berejka**, who directs **REI's** government and community engagement. "We look forward to working with the Governor and others to find ways to better support the people, communities, and entrepreneurs who help make Washington one of the best states in the country for outdoor recreation."

In addition to the state agencies and the WWRC, the coalition includes American Whitewater, Back Country Horsemen of Washington, Bicycle Alliance of Washington, Citizens for Parks & Recreation, Coastal Conservation Association, Evergreen Bike Alliance, Fish Northwest, Northwest Marine Trade Association, Northwest Motorcycle Association, Northwest Sport fishing Industry Association, Northwest Yacht Brokers Association, Puget Sound Anglers, and the Recreational Boating Association of Washington.

Others include REI, Ski Washington, The Mountaineers, The Nature Conservancy, The Trust for Public Land, The Wilderness Society, Washington Scuba Alliance, Washington State Motorsports Dealers Association, Washington State Parks Foundation, Washington State Snowmobile Association, Washington Trails Association, Washington Environmental Council, Washington Off Highway Vehicle Alliance, Washington Public Ports Association, and the Washington Recreation and Park Association.



# RECIPE OF THE MONTH CREAM SHERRY PHEASANT

## **Ingredients:**

1 finely chopped shallot

1 c. sliced mushrooms

¼ c. cream sherry

1-3 cloves garlic

3 cups homemade pheasant stock OR low sodium chicken broth

4 pheasant (or grouse) breasts

1 cup heavy cream

4 Tbs. Butter

salt/pepper

1cup chopped green onion (1/4" lengths)

## **Directions:**

Reduce pheasant stock or chicken broth at low heat to a simmer to half. Slice pheasant or grouse breasts lengthwise and season with salt and pepper. Roll in flour and sauté in butter in separate cast iron skillet. Add shallot, garlic, and mushrooms. Brown meat on both sides then deglaze with cream sherry. When sherry has been reduced to almost nothing, add 1 c. pheasant stock or chicken broth and heavy cream. Bring contents to boil and put the iron skillet in the oven at 375 degrees for at least 8 minutes or until done. Top each serving with chopped onions

Serve over mashed potatoes, with a side vegetable of your choice.

Note: The pheasant or grouse can be legs and thighs with breasts too.


