

Hi all.

Where are all the waterfowl? This is the time of year that all the local spots are covered in ducks and geese — not this year though. I haven't got them figured out yet, but any day now the **Chehalis Valley** will be covered in feathered fowl. At least I hope so.

Last Saturday I had the pleasure of leading a small bunch of *Boy Scouts* to most of our Wood Duck nesting boxes on **Scatter Creek**. One of them will be doing his **Eagle Scout**

Project by setting up a nesting box program on the **Nisqually River.** I showed them what they will be doing once their program is in place.

Our Chapter voted to support this young Scout with education and donation of materials. Jon McAninch, WWA member and owner of *Cedarville Farms Waterfowl Club* has donated three (3) complete boxes to give them a great start. This is one of the many things that the WWA does to promote Wildfowl Conservation and Youth Outdoor Activities.

The first box we checked had a decomposing dead squirrel in it. It was pretty stinky so I don't think the Wood Duck will be using it this season. The second box we checked had the remains of hatched Wood Duck eggs! No un-hatched eggs. The rest of our boxes either had Merganser hatches or live squirrels in them. Two went unchecked as of this writing. Only one box out of seven (7) had a Wood Duck hatch. I think

More On Yakima Valley Hen Houses

In previous issues, we have shared our chapter's interest and work toward getting a number of hen houses built and placed in the **Yakima Valley**, to try and help with local duck production. Our initial effort was to get 20 hen houses built, paid for and placed this year.

Here's where we are in that effort so far:

As of the beginning of March, we got our 20 hen houses built. As of this date, all but seven (7) have been purchased and placed for use this Spring by nesting hens. Hopefully we can get the last few sold and placed soon, or they will have to wait until next late-winter.

I purchased three (3), and was given permission to place them on the Yakama Indian Reservation by tribe waterfowl biologist David Blodgett III. David and I took a couple of hours one afternoon in late February, and installed the tubes out at Satus Wildlife Recreation Area (WRA), east of Toppenish. We put them in locations with year-round water, that will be easy for him to check frequently. We are considering these three (3) tubes our "trial-run" for this year. If they are successful, we will increase the number next year.

Predation is an obvious problem everywhere, and the **Yakima Valley** is no exception. Having these tubes over water will hopefully give a few hens a safe place to pull off a brood. Our tubes are designed off of plans from **Delta Waterfowl**, an organization with a long track record. Being over water keeps them out of reach of coyotes, raccoons, bobcats, etc. The size of the entrance is supposed to provide protection from raptors. Let's hope they work out.

I personally would like to see a 100 or more tubes in the **Yakima Valley** placed in the next couple of years. I'll keep you up to date on our efforts.

it's still worth the effort we have put in. None of the boxes were vandalized this year.

The oak trees along **Scatter Creek** haven't had a very good crop of acorns for five (5) years now. Our hopes are that they start producing to attract and hold more Wood Ducks.

Because of scheduling problems combined with a slow season (and a bit of bad luck) the winners of the <u>Cedarville Hunt for Two</u> didn't have that great of a hunt. Jon McAninch has generously offered both winners another hunt in the upcoming season and both have accepted! On that note, Jon has offered the WWA another two (2) waterfowl hunts to raffle off. These are premium hunts that can bring in a lot of capital for your Chapter. Two, one-day waterfowl hunts for two (2) people, with a night's lodging on the Cedarville properties! It doesn't get any better than that for the price of the tickets.

Same as last year we will be offering all **WWA**Chapters tickets to sell. The Chapter keeps all proceeds after a small price for ticket printing. Over 665 tickets total were sold last year. The ticket money our Chapter made paid for our annual Youth Shooting Event.

We had some great work parties last year and put together 20 Wood Duck Nest Boxes. These are some exceptionally well made boxes that should last for many years. They are so nice that we decided to sell some of them to make money for more cedar to make more boxes. If you would like to purchase one or more just get with me and I will fix you up. If you order your box within the next 30 minutes, installation is free! Actually installation is free with the purchase price of \$35.00, within a reasonable distance from Rochester.



For a February day we were fortunate to have great weather. We convened back at the check station for burgers and chilicooked up by **Arlan Hackett**.

Reports back on blind conditions were highlighted by the difficulty accessing blinds 9, 13, and 18. The trails have such deep mud that staying on your feet and getting to the blinds is a real challenge. We hope to work with the

refuge to improve access next season. Blind 9 will need to be raised up as it has 5" of water in the blind. Blind 18 is infested with nutria. The holes and waste created by the invasive rodents will dictate stepped up efforts to eliminate the problem.

The handicapped blind has some issues with the floor that will need some work. In general the consensus was less trash and spent shell casings this clean up.

The **Northwest Chapter** has had a busy postseason, with members cleaning Wood Duck Nesting Boxes and building new ones. A few members met up to build 15 new boxes and get to enjoy some of the post season meat



Douglas "Doug" William Graef


Our friend, long time **WWA** Board Member, and chief architect of **WWA's WA Duck Stamp and Print Program, Doug Graef,** age 73, of Redmond, WA passed away on February 19, 2014 of esophageal cancer that he first disclosed to his many friends on the **WA Refuge Forum** in late October of 2013.

Doug was a quiet and humble leader. As described at his *Celebration of Life* gathering in his honor, "always the consummate gentleman." For years he gave up his opening day of the waterfowl season to be a greeter and ambassador for **WWA** at the **Skagit Wildlife Area**. He demonstrated the dedication and perseverance to lead **WWA** in one of the most ambitious projects in its history — taking over from **WDFW**, the management of the **WA State Duck Stamp and Print Program**, where he established a firm foundation for the program into the future.

Articulate on any subject but never a braggart, few at his memorial service had knowledge of his distinguished service in the US Navy, where he earned the National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal and two (2) Bronze Stars.

He is survived by his wife of 39 years, **Barbara**; his children, **Lisa (Paul)** of Pocatello, ID; and **Ryan (Savannah)** of Missoula, MT; his grandson, **Bridger** of Pocatello; and his brother, **Allan** of Long Beach, CA.



WDFW asks public's help to generate leads in shooting of radio-collared wolf

OLYMPIA - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WFDW) is seeking the public's help to identify the person or persons responsible for shooting and killing a gray wolf last month in Stevens County. A 2-year-old black female wolf from the Smackout Pack was found dead February 9th near Cedar Lake in northeast Stevens County.

WDFW, with the help of three non-profit organizations, is offering a reward of up to \$22,500 for information leading to an arrest and conviction in the case. Conservation Northwest, the Center for Biological Diversity, and The Humane Society of the United States, have each pledged \$7,500 to create the reward.

Gray wolves are protected throughout the state. The illegal killing of a wolf is punishable by up to one year in jail and a fine of up to \$5,000.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

TEAL EMPANADA

INGREDIENTS

12 Teal breasts

4 T plus 2 t olive oil

2 T unsalted butter

2 med yellow onions, finely sliced

2 t sugar

2 eight oz. pkgs. goat cheese

Puff pastry sheets

1 cup hoisin

sauce

1/4 cup sweet chili sauce

1/4 cup soy sauce



DIRECTIONS

- Heat 4 T olive oil and the butter in a large saute' pan, and add the onions, Season with
- sugar and a pinch of salt and pepper, Cook stirring frequently, until the onions caramelize, about 25 minutes. Transfer the onions to a mixing owl to cool at room temperature. Add the cheese to the bowl, but don't mix just yet.
- Add 2 T olive oil to the same pan and raise the heat to high. Working in batches, sear the
 breasts. About 3-4 minutes per side. Transfer to a cutting board, and thinly slice across the
 grain, then run the knife back through them for a nice mince. Add meat to the onions and
 cheese and mix it all together with your hands. Add salt and pepper to taste.
- Flour your countertop. Take one sheet of puff pastry and cut rounds with a 3" cookie cutter. Holding a round in one hand, place a spoonful of the filling on the center, fold over, pinch the seam shut, then crimp it with a fork. Stick each batch in the freezer before
- moving on to a new sheet of pastry.
- No need to thaw the empanadas before cooking. Just drop six at a time into a 360 degree fryer or Dutch oven with fresh peanut oil. They take 7-9 minutes o everything to be ooey and gooey inside. Whisk together the hoisin sauce, chile sauce, and soy sauce for a killer dip.
- Serve with the ice cold beverage of your choice.


