



Richard "Dick" Briggs December 1, 1930 to September 26, 2014 Lifelong Waterfowl Hunter and Advocate

I first met **Dick** late in the summer of 2005. As I recall the introduction went something like this: "I'm **Dick Briggs.** I want to join your club. Where do I sign and who do I pay?" It was like I didn't really have much choice in the matter and "NO" definitely wasn't an option. From that point on this rather gruff old gentleman became a member of the Cedarville Farms Hunt Club, and I became his friend-in-training.

Breaking through **Dick's** armor really wasn't all that difficult if you had any of his passions in common. After sharing some space in the blind on a few hunts, followed [regardless of the hour] by breakfast (eggs over easy, bacon & hash browns crisp, rye toast – dry), we both came to realize how parallel our lives actually were. Both of us had an insatiable appetite for waterfowl hunting, salmon and steelhead fishing, and business. We both had fishing and hunting adventures that could have only been scripted by the same author. (Continued on Page 5)

As time passed **Dick's** armor thinned dramatically, and he would always manage to squeeze in a few comments about yet another passion, his daughter, **Julia**. He was very proud of **Julia** and talked often about their fishing trips; her being on a scull rowing team; attending college; and bringing team and classmates home to spend the weekend. A lifelong conservative, he would feign a little disgust at times about some left of center leaning that **Julia** might have disclosed to him, but it would always be followed up with a smile.

As the armor disappeared, admiration from friends for this man's drive and tenacity grew. Over the last few years health issues plagued **Dick**, often burning up opportunities for him to enjoy time with family, or get out to hunt or fish. He fought back numerous times when any lesser man would have given up. He cheated death more than once to squeeze in one of **Julia's** rowing events here or another waterfowl hunt there. His boat the **Seagar** was all refurbished and ready for future salmon trips, and no one doubted him when he said he'd soon be washing fish scales out of the cockpit and barbequing fresh King fillets.

Dick was a member of the **WWA**, but I really don't know much about the history of his membership. Records show at least since 2008. I do know that he generously donated \$1000.00 to the **WWA** legal fund, and he was an outspoken advocate for the Resource and for our hunting/shooting heritage. May you rest in peace, friend.

Dick Jacobs March 12, 1944 to July 18, 2014 Lifelong Waterfowl Hunter and Advocate By Kurt Snyder

Dick lost his courageous battle with cancer, peacefully at home in front of a cozy fire, surrounded by his loving family on July 18, 2014. A life long area resident, Dick was born in Aberdeen, Wash. on March 12, 1944. Being a lifetime waterfowler, he joined the WWA at the start-up of the Grays Harbor Chapter. He supported all our events and endeavors. As a member of the WDFW Waterfowl Advisory Group (WAG), Dick was involved in the lawmaking process by giving his input for the Group's recommendations to the WDFW Commission.

Dick was "duck hunter" to the core. He was very involved with **Ducks Unlimited**, never missing a dinner/auction, be it local or around the U.S. He was honored at the February **2014** DU Banquet in **Montesano** for his outstanding contributions to waterfowl and wetlands conservation and for his countless volunteer hours at **Greenhead Farms**.

He was also a member of the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Safari Club International, North America Wild Sheep Foundation, a former Director of the Mule Deer Foundation and Life member of the NRA. Because of his love for hunting, you could usually find Dick shopping at *Cabela's* at least 3-4 times a month. Rest in peace, friend.

Bill in WA Legislature to Force WDFW to do Their Primary Job

House Bill 1676 is a bill that is supported by the Hunters Heritage Council (HHC) of the Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC) as a high priority bill. HB 1676 may be the most important bill of the 2015 regular session for Hunters! This bill forces the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) to do what they should have been doing long ago — that is conduct a scientific, peer-reviewed study assessing the health of Washington's wild ungulate population in game management units that have experienced a change in predator population dynamics due to the reintroduction and recovery of gray wolves in WA State.

Ungulates include deer and elk and the term roughly means "a hoofed animal." Most ungulates use the tips of their toes, usually hoofed, to sustain their whole body weight while moving.

HB 1676 would force the Department to conduct a baseline on ungulates and the effect[s] that all predators have on ungulate populations.

The Bill is scheduled for Executive Session on Wednesday, **February 18, 2015 at 8:00 AM.** Concerned Hunters need to let the members of the House Agriculture and **Natural Resources Committee** know that they need to pass this bill out of committee with a "do pass" recommendation. Work Party

On February 19th 2015 at 9:00 A.M., we will meet at the **Ephrata Office of the WDFW** located at:

1550 Alder St N.W. Ephrata, WA 98823

We will be building two (2) ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) capable hunting blinds that will ultimately be placed on the Frenchman Regulated Access Area (RAA) (f/k/a the Frenchman Quality Hunt Area), after we have completed gravelling the road later this Spring.

The Ephrata Shop where we will be building the blinds is located in the annex to the South of the **WDFW** office building and can be entered from the back side of the building. **WWA** will furnish lunch for the blind project.

This project is part one of an Aquatic Lands
Enhancement Account (ALEA) grant that we secured to (1) build and install the pair of ADA capable blinds and (2) create an access road into them. The road project will be completed later this Spring and will entail the laying of fabric weed block and spreading gravel by the dump truck loads from the blinds to the entry off Road C. The entry ultimately will have a padlock and the key will be available to handicapped hunters through the reservation system.

Part 2 of the ALEA Grant — March Work Party

Sometime in March we will have a work party to lay out 7,690 feet of fabric weed block prior to gravelling the road into the **ADA** blinds built in February. We'll try and do this project on a Saturday so more folks can participate as this will require a fair amount of volunteers. As incentive, it will also provide an excellent chance for those who have not yet hunted the **Frenchman RAA** to do some off season scouting of the area. Hopefully we can pick a Saturday with nice warm weather and minimal wind.

ALEA Grant Applications Due February 28th

OLYMPIA – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is accepting grant applications through February 28, 2015 for volunteer projects that benefit fish and wildlife.

WDFW currently expects from \$1.1 to \$1.36 million to be available for these grants, funded through the state's Aquatic Land Enhancement Account (ALEA), beginning July 1, 2015. Interested persons can apply at: http://alea.fluidreview.com.

Five (5) major types of projects are funded through the program, although others may be considered. These project types include habitat restoration, scientific research/citizen science, public education, facility development and artificial fish production.

Eligible applicants are individual citizens, non-profit organizations, schools (including universities), tribes and political subdivisions of the state such as conservation districts. For-profit businesses, and state and federal agencies are not eligible.

Funds are provided on a cost-reimbursement basis and may not be used for salaries, wages, stipends or benefits. Grantees are required to follow state purchasing rules and report on their progress quarterly. For more information, visit the ALEA Grant Program website at wdfw.wa.gov/grants/alea/.





WDFW Open House re: Leque Is.

From WDFW Restoration Projects

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and Ducks Unlimited (DU) will host a public Open House on Wednesday, February 25th from 6:30 – 8:30 pm in the Stanwood Middle School cafeteria at 9405 - 271st Street NW in Stanwood, regarding the future of Leque Island.

Leque Island, located west of Stanwood between Port Susan and Skagit bays, was once entirely salt marsh. Today it consists of wetlands and diked agricultural fields. WDFW began acquiring properties on Leque Island in 1974, and currently owns the entirety of the island aside from road right-of-ways controlled by Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and Snohomish County (Highway 532).

Contract farmers annually plant cereal grain as food for wintering waterfowl (mainly ducks and snow geese). This site offers bird watching, bird dog training, and pheasant and waterfowl hunting.

The perimeter dikes on the island have repeatedly failed during high tide and storm events, most recently in 2010. Temporary repairs were made in 2010 to patch the dikes in two locations that were breached. **WDFW** and **DU** are working cooperatively with grant funding to determine a long-term solution to the failing dikes. Together they will draft potential design alternatives and **WDFW** will select the preferred alternative with input from stakeholders. This project is referred to as the *Leque Island Alternatives Analysis and Design Project*.

The portion of **Leque Island** south of Highway 532 is approximately 250 acres in size and is currently isolated from tidal inundation with perimeter dikes built in the early 1900's. The perimeter dikes are in a state of disrepair, and high tides combined with storm events have caused the dikes to be breached multiple times; most recently in 2010.

WDFW and **DU** have acquired grant funding to conduct an alternatives analysis and design project to examine potential solutions to the failing dikes.

The objective of the proposed Leque Island Alternatives Analysis and Design Project is to develop and examine potential design options for Leque Island, select the preferred alternative design, and to advance the preferred alternative design to permit-level stage.

WDFW and DU will draft alternative conceptual designs, use models to predict effects of each design, analyze merits and drawbacks of each design, and solicit input from stakeholders to assist with WDFW's selection of the preferred design alternative. Design alternatives analyzed as part of this process will range from reconstruction of existing dikes, to construction of dikes in various setback locations, to complete removal of dikes.

At this Open House, **WDFW** and **DU** staff will present a summary of progress made on the **Leque Island Alternatives Analysis and Design Project** since it was initiated at a public meeting on October 30th, 2013. Included in this presentation will be an overview of six (6) design alternatives that were developed with input from the project **Stakeholder Advisory Committee**, as well as the framework used to analyze each of the design alternatives.

After the presentation, attendees will break out into stations and have the opportunity to learn more details about the overall project, ask questions, and provide feedback. A questionnaire will be handed out to collect written input.

WDFW intends to select the preferred design alternative by the end of March, and will then advance to the next design phase. WDFW Enforcement Has Huge Problems

OLYMPIA — The **Department of Fish and Wildlife's Enforcement Division** is a serious mess and someone needs to be held accountable, say critics inside and outside the division.

Controversy surrounding the Department's administration — including internal investigations, allegations of cronyism and a federal civil-rights lawsuit — has been circulating among Washington's game wardens and marine officers for years. But what was once an internal affair has now boiled over into the Legislature, and the level of dysfunction is becoming undeniable.

In the past three (3) years, nine (9) officers have either quit or retired early from **WDFW** enforcement, a rate unparalleled in the last 20 years, according to senior officers.

"The big picture is that you've got a law enforcement agency - the second biggest law-enforcement agency in the state - and it's poorly run, dishonest, unsupervised and is out of control," said Matthew Nixon, who retired in 2012 after a 19-year stint with WDFW enforcement. 




