

Washington: Anti-Gun AG Promises Firearm and Magazine Ban Legislation Next Year

Anti-gun Washington
Attorney General Bob Ferguson
announced that he will propose
legislation during the 2017
Legislative Session to ban the
sale of popular and
commonly-owned

semi-automatic rifles and ammunition magazines. While the legislation has not yet been drafted, your **NRA-ILA** fully expects it to follow the same anti-gun blueprints being called for by the Bloomberg/Clinton gun control supporters.

AG Ferguson's announcement comes on the heels of a call for similar legislation by anti-gun groups in Washington, the same groups claiming that their goal wasn't to take anyone's gun while advocating for Initiative 594 in 2014. Having now called for the banning of the most commonly owned firearms and ammunition magazines, these gun control groups have revealed their lie and proven that their real goal is to repeal the Second Amendment in Washington State, one step at a time.

Duck Banding Update:



<u>State Presents Hydrology Forecast for South Shillapoo</u> <u>Juvenile Salmon Project</u>

At our August meeting the project leader Nicole

Czarnomiski gave a presentation on the projected hydrology for the proposed juvenile salmon project. Also attending were Regional Wildlife Program Manager Sandra Jonker,

Wildlife Area Manager Daren Hauswald, Engineer Alex Uber and Biologist Matthew Wilson. We would like to thank the following WWA Board Members and Officers for driving down to our meeting for this important presentation:

President Jim Cortines, Treasurer John Arrabito, former President Rone Brewer, Board Members Terry Satre,

Howard Hicks.

The short version is this: When the **Columbia River** is running at high levels due to rain in the winter or run off in the spring there will be water in the area. As soon as the tide or river level drops water will drain from the wildlife area with no residual ponds or holding water for wildlife or waterfowl. The projected costs of \$10-13 million will have the bulk of the money going towards raising **Lower River Road** to create 2-3 bridges with breaches 40' to 200' wide into the wildlife area.

We found it incomprehensible that no thorough studies have been done to determine the long term effect on wildlife from this project. The spring floods will wipe out waterfowl nests that previously had been safe in the more stable habitat. The bottom line is this: The **Shillapoo**Juvenile Salmon Project is going to drain vital, viable wetlands that currently support a host of wildlife species and provide nesting habitat for local waterfowl. We cannot support such a misguided endeavor.

Ferd Nist Trophy Shoot has a New Champion!

There's a new Sheriff in Town and his name is Bill Maxwell. Last month at the half-way point of the competition I told you I wouldn't release his name so as to "jinx" him, and apparently that was a good move on my part.

Bill broke 88 targets in three (3) different disciplines, 16-yard trap; a 16-23 yard slider; and doubles. His score was the highest since former WWA President (and current Idaho resident) Gary Webster won the event in 2011.








Columbia Basin Chapter Youth Upland Bird Hunt

The Columbia Basin Chapter of Pheasants Forever (CBPF), Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), and B & G Farms in Royal City are partnering in an effort to recruit youth into the sport of hunting by providing youths an opportunity to hunt wild and planted birds in some of the best habitat available in Grant County. Years ago, WDFW partnered with B & G Farms to install shrub plots to provide optimal bird habitat, particularly important to pheasant survival during rough winter conditions. In addition, dense nesting cover has been planted between shrub rows to provide quality nesting cover which can help boost

annual productivity of wild birds. These numerous, but relatively small (several acre), habitat plots have matured to high quality habitat and will serve as ideal locations to plant birds throughout the day, to ensure that all youths are safely dispersed and have a good chance at kicking up birds. CBPF is donating the birds to the cause and is currently recruiting volunteers to help ensure a safe and enjoyable hunt by pairing an experienced hunter with each youth. Additionally, WDFW will provide assistance of a certified Hunter Education instructor to give each youth a refresher course on hunter safety before beginning the hunt. And, as an added bonus, every youth participant will have a **chance of winning a 20-gauge shotgun!**

Hunters are encouraged to make a reservation for this hunt day; **Saturday, September 17**th (anytime between 9am and 2pm). Though not required, the reservation will help planners ensure an adequate supply of pheasants and refreshments for after the hunt (*make reservations at:* http://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/hunting_access/private_lands/hunt/392/). Please help us protect our hunting heritage by participating in this unique opportunity!




