

Luke Hawk cleaning out and refurbishing 33 boxes and
hanging 22 new ones. Bob put four, 8-hour days with
Luke to get the boxes done in time for the wood ducks
pairing up. The tree mounted boxes continue to show
signs of predator interference with the nesting and
hatching process. The boxes are being converted to
steel posts which have almost no predation issues.

One of our first **WWA** boxes hung on a tree just west of the **Lafromboise** Road Boat Launch has been a consistent producer even though it is tree mounted. One box was full of leaves. Upon release of the box bottom an explosion of unhappy squirrel dropped down into the water. Apparently properly motivated squirrels aren't bad swimmers!



March Chapter Meeting:

Our guest speaker at the meeting was **Kyle Spragens WDFW Waterfowl Section Manager**. **Kyle** gave a presentation on **Migratory Waterfowl Seasons and Regulations**. This presentation was presented to the **WDFW Commission** at their March meeting.

Kyle provided the group with a firm understanding of how changes in the hunting regulations framework is determined through the Pacific Flyway Council, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) regulations committee and our state Fish and Wildlife Commission. He also spoke about the public comment process and how public input is used to influence the process. The Department provides for proposed hunting season input through the WDFW website.

He presented the 2019-2020 Duck Season Proposal and reviewed it's similarities or differences in relation to the 2018-2019 season. **Kyle** also provided data on Goose and Brant population status and their associated season proposals. Management agencies utilize **Adaptive Harvest Management** (AHM) to establish seasons based on Survey data and population models.

Kyle fielded a broad range of questions from the meeting participants and a good level of discussion ensued.

Also in attendance was **Callie Moore, WDFW Biologist**. **Callie** has held several positions as a wildlife biologist and her current assignment is in the **Skagit Wildlife Area**. We are looking forward to working with **Callie** in the coming months.

Thanks to Kyle and Callie for attending our chapter meeting and sharing information with us!

Thanks to members of the chapter we completed our annual cleanup of the **Skagit Wildlife Area Farmed Island** on March 30th. We had 3 boats and a dozen donuts to get us to the landing.



Seattle Chapter News

April Meeting:

The April 24th meeting of the **Seattle Chapter** will feature a presentation from **Martha Jordan**, Executive Director of the **Northwest Swan Conservation Association**, and affectionately known by locals as "**The Swan Lady!**" **Martha** has been advocating for swans for more than 40 years.

Previously the problem of lead poisoning of swans in the Northwest was mostly contained to an area known as **Judson Lake**, a trans boundary body of shallow water that is three quarters in the U.S. [Whatcom Co., WA] and one quarter in Canada. Unfortunately more recently the problem has moved south with more than 50 swans found dead in 2015 in the Carnation-Fall City area of King County. Since March 17th of this year, another 60 trumpeter swans have been found dead or dying at Crescent Lake in the Snoqualmie Waterfowl Area, in Snohomish County, WA. Necropsies have confirmed the deaths are the result of lead poisoning.

Lead shot has been banned in WA since the early 1990's, but as the natural infilling process in these popular waterfowling areas makes them progressively shallower over the years, the swans with their long necks, can now reach these muddy bottoms while feeding. There they pick up lead shot left from decades of waterfowling in these areas before the lead ban. It takes as few as two (2) lead pellets to kill a Trumpeter swan, the largest waterfowl in North America!

A **BIG THANKS** to **Paul McGovern** for making the March monthly meeting a special treat. Literally! **Paul** let us in on his secret recipe to his duck and pork, smoked pepperoni snack sticks. He took us through the entire process from grinding up the duck meat, to stuffing the mix into a collagen casing, and my personal favorite he smoked some for us right out side the **Kenmore Trap Range** so we all got to give them a taste before the night was over!

Here's the complete recipe as promised from the March newsletter:

Step 1: Grinding meat:

Take 2 lbs of cut-up skinless duck breast.

Grind duck in the grinder with a **coarse plate** then a second (2nd) time with the **fine plate**.

Step 2: Mixing meat:

Mix duck with 2 lbs Jimmy Dean hot breakfast sausage (50/50 ratio duck/sausage)

Mix cure from Cabela's Mix into the meat.

Slowly sprinkle Pepperoni spice, 1 tablespoon per 1 lb combined pepporoni meat. Mix meat for 8 minutes by hand.

Step 3: Stuffing the casings:

Clean out grinder and load **the combined pepperoni meat** into the hopper.

Cut and load the 21 mm casing on the grinder cone.

Feed out 12-16 inches of **stuffed pepperoni**. Cut and twist end. Reload casing

Step 4: Smoking the Pepperoni sticks

Smoker cook the links at 150-170 degrees until meat thermometer reads 165 degrees internal temp!

Unfortunately what this picture doesn't show is that under the live Swan in the boat were six (6) dead ones picked up along the shores of Crescent Lake.

The husband and wife team, **Cindy** and **Joe**, do have a newer truck that they use to get to every event and get the all-terrain power chair to all of the hunt camps. However it is paid for out of pocket not on the organizations dime.

This is a fully functioning guide service run by volunteers, they have outfitters tents, firearms, cooking equipment, food for the hunter and their family and all the volunteers, and they take 20 kids a year out hunting and fishing. Costs pile up especially for food and other amenities for all these people. So no, **Cindy** and **Joe** do not make it to every camp but they do have food for the volunteers so the hunter and their families get to enjoy every aspect of these trips!

All in all, I would say that this organization has proven its self to be quite charitable and was awarded *Organization of the Year in 2017* by Washington **Department of Fish and Wildlife** and have brought 20 kids in the last year to experience the joy of hunting.

These claims are dramatic and baseless. **Y.O.U** is a 501(c) organization, so you can look at all of their financial records for yourself to validate their efficiencies, and if you have questions please reach out to me, I'm happy to discuss.

A great deal of time and funding has gone into installing over 120 nest-tubes in wetlands around **Grant County** over the past 20 years (usually provided by **WWA**, **Aquatic Lancs Enhancement Account (ALEA) Funds** and other sources). Sadly, many of these nest-tubes are now deep in the tall emergent vegetation, which has encroached over time.

While **WDFW** is battling wetland succession and *phragmites* invasion to the best of our ability, it feels like a never-ending

battle. Many excavations to open up basins have taken place the last few years, with more planned...so, we're trying!. But, we will attempt to maintain some tubes that are still in open water.

WDFW reviewed historic data for over 120 nest tube locations, and we are planning to maintain and monitor 50 specific tubes over the next five (5) years. Tubes will be evaluated for hen use as well as nesting success to better understand the potential and cost-effectiveness of this tool for improving mallard production.

Additionally, many supplies for new duck tubes were provided to neighboring Districts in Yakima

County and Okanogan County, so they could install some tubes in their wetlands.

In late March, numerous volunteers from the Moses Lake Chapter of the Washington Waterfowl Association and others helped WDFW create 30 new duck nesting tubes. Many of these same dedicated folks helped install them the very next day. WDFW is grateful to these hardcore waterfowlers that continue to devote their free time to improving duck production in the Basin.




TREASURER'S REPORT




