

The week-long camps for both Boys and Girls are held at the Camp Moran Environmental Learning Center in Moran State Park on Orcas Island in mid July.

Girls Camp is – Sunday, July 14 to Saturday, July 20. Boys Camp is Sunday, July 21 to Saturday, July 27. Since 1952 the Washington State Youth

Conservation Camp (also known as the WA State Junior
Sportsmen's Conservation Camp) has been educating
campers ages 12 to 16 about the outdoors, and how to
wisely enjoy them. They encourage conservation methods
to ensure our resources will be there for "future
generations." The camp is located on breathtaking Orcas
Island at the foot of Mount Constitution, in the
Environmental Learning Center of Moran State Park.

Activities include Archery, Hunter Safety Training [Range use is restricted to spring loaded BB guns. No live firearms are brought to camp], Survival in the Outdoors [including shelter building; fire building, and water collection], the basics of fishing [in a stocked lake], how to canoe, and a 6-mile, day hike DOWN Mount Constitution with a stop for a picnic lunch and a fun visit to Cascade Falls.

Campers are grouped by age. There are 8-12 campers per cabin. Each cabin is assigned a Senior and Junior Counselor. Cabin assignments may be requested, but placement cannot be guaranteed.

There will be a Senior AND a Junior counselor assigned to each cabin. There will always be one with their campers/cabin at all times (outside of free swim time and meal time); including at night.

Junior counselors often range in age from 16-18. Senior counselors range from 17-23. All counselors have previously been outstanding campers and/or who showed the ability to lead by example, the maturity to follow instructions, and the responsibility to make good decisions. They go through training before camp begins, and meet with the Head Counselor daily throughout the week.

Camp will have a licensed nurse on staff, able and trained to deal with emergency situations, as well as everyday cuts and scrapes. There is an ambulance and emergency clinic on the island as well.

All staff and instructors receive a comprehensive national screening and background check.

No More On-The-Ground Nest Counts

WDFW will not be performing the annual "goose nest surveys" for the next several years, according to Ella Rowan, WDFW Assistant District Wildlife Biologist out of the Ephrata Office. Management has needed to reevaluate projects, which is likely tied to funding problems and needing to ensure we are spending money on projects that will provide the best data and outcomes. "We are a bit short-handed right now, and it may get worse. It was always fun seeing you, and thank you all for your work on this project over the years. If additional opportunities arise, we will be in touch."

WWA Goldeneye Nest Box Report

Upon my inquiry of **WDFW** about the current status of the Goldeneye Nest Boxes built by **WWA** members and others at the Ephrata office four (4) years ago, I

received the following response and pass it on for all the folks that had worked on that project.

From WDFW's Matt Wilson: "I checked six (6) in 2018 – there was use in two (2) boxes with some scouting signs (down and contour feathers) and preliminary nest building. I have plans to get out there this summer to see what use we had this past spring. Sea duck cavity nesters are notoriously slow to adopt new boxes."



RULES -- WWA FERD NIST MEMORIAL TROPHY

2019 Duck Stamp Artist & Stamp

Meet the 2019 Washington State Duck Stamp Competition Winner and Washington Waterfowl Association's (WWA) Artist of the Year: Catherine Temple.



Catherine Temple is a wildlife and pet portrait artist residing near Clarkston, Washington. In this rugged, beautiful and diverse terrain she finds the inspiration for her art while pursuing her other passions of photography, bird watching and hunting with her husband, Brian and dog, Balin.

Catherine began her love affair with art, birds and dogs at an early age in rural northern Illinois. Her father had a passion for raising exotic birds and animals and this gave her ample opportunities to develop her drawing skills as well as her love of nature and the outdoors. As an adult she continued to hone her skills by studying biology and taxidermy to better understand the anatomy of the birds and animals she loved to paint.

When she acquired her first hunting dog, a Chesapeake Bay retriever named **Jake**, a deep bond was formed. Out of love for her dog she decided to paint his portrait and soon discovered that there were others who loved their dogs as much as she did. This developed a new direction for her art, and she has since created dozens of portraits for pet owners across the country.

Primarily a self-taught artist, **Catherine** enjoys painting with water-based media, especially acrylic, as this gives her the most versatility in creating the detail and realism that her art is known for. As she develops the painting, she almost always completes the eyes

first as she believes this brings the spirit and character of the animal to life. This is also what most people viewing her paintings comment on first.

In recent years all of **Catherine's** passions of art, the outdoors, ducks and dogs have led her to begin entering duck stamp contests. She received her first win with the **2017-2018 Delaware Duck Stamp** depicting her Chesapeake Bay retriever, **Balin**, and canvasback ducks. Most recently she was chosen to create the **2019-2020 Washington Duck Stamp** which depicts a chocolate lab and ring-necked ducks. Her canine art has garnered awards from **Art Show at the Dog Show** in Witchita, Kansas, and she has won several awards locally for her wildlife art.

Catherine considers her art to be a calling, one that is both challenging and fulfilling and a gift from God that she is to share with others. She continues to enjoy participating in the realm of duck stamp competitions as well as showing her work locally and regionally and completing commissioned work for her collectors.

WDFW News for the Flock

Summary of 2018 BPOP Surveys

By Matthew Wilson, WDFW Statewide Waterfowl Specialist

WDFW conducted the annual breeding pair count (BPOP) for waterfowl throughout Washington this spring. Flying in a Bell Jet Ranger helicopter, and following standardized transects, surveys were conducted at an elevation from 75 to 300 feet above ground level, and cruising up to 90 knots. Individual wetlands within 1/8 mile (200 meters) on either side of the transect line are flown to get a complete count.

Observers record data on Species, Number, Sex, Composition (Ione bird, pair, flock, group) as well as information on the type, extent, and seasonality of all water bodies, natural and artificial alike. The surveys were completed in four (4) days on the west side of the Cascade Crest and five (5) days on the east side.

Transcription and analysis of the aerial data is nearly complete with lower overall numbers than the previous few years anticipated. Results will be made available online and to **WWA** as soon as possible.

Beginning in late April, west side biologists began surveys near Bellingham in the North Puget Lowlands, continuing on the west side of Puget Sound south to Chehalis and north again throughout Hood Canal, wrapping around Dungeness Spit to the Port Angeles area. In general, conditions were below average overall with fewer persistent wetlands and ponds.

Continuing to the east side, biologist covered heavily irrigated areas in the Yakima Valley, and Columbia Basin, working from Richland north to Ephrata. Continuing north, Douglas County and the Okanogan Valley are flown, followed by the Northeast Highlands near Colville and the potholes and ponds of the Turnbull and Channeled Scabland regions.

Not surprisingly, conditions were drier than the previous two (2) years, with noticeable changes in natural water body availability, like small ponds and potholes, especially in the **Yakima** and **Columbia Basin Regions.**

WDFW News Briefs...

Northwest States, Tribes Apply to Feds for OK to Kill More Columbia Sea Lions

June 13, 2019, By Andy Walgamott

The **WDFW**, along with a consortium of state and tribal partners, today submitted an expanded application to lethally remove California and Steller sea lions preying on threatened and endangered salmon and steelhead runs in the Columbia River and its tributaries. Steller sea lions have not previously been subject to lethal removal.

The application submitted to the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) by WDFW and its partners is the first since Congress passed an amendment to the Marine Mammals Protection Act (MMPA) in December 2018. That amendment, spearheaded by the Pacific Northwest congressional delegation, passed with strong bipartisan support and offers greater flexibility to wildlife managers when determining if a sea lion should be lethally removed in waters that host ESA-listed runs of salmon or steelhead.

WDFW and its partners have taken steps to deter California sea lions in the Columbia River basin for more than a decade, but non-lethal measures have proven largely ineffective, driving animals away for only short periods. If approved, WDFW expects to begin humanely removing animals under the terms of the expanded application beginning in 2020. The application is subject to a public comment period and review by NMFS. Annual Target Shooting Restrictions Take Effect at Wenas Wildlife Area

YAKIMA – To reduce the risk of wildfires, the WDFW will again restrict target shooting on the 105,000-acre **Wenas Wildlife Area** near Yakima and Ellensburg. The restriction, which will be in effect June 5 through Sept. 30, will limit target shooting to the hours between sunrise and 10 a.m., when the risk of starting a wildfire is less severe.

The department has restricted target shooting every summer since 2012, with the support of the community-based **Wenas Wildlife Area Advisory Committee.**

- Providing scholarships for boys and girls to attend a week at Youth Conservation Camp on Orcas Island, WA
- Working with the WDFW in the creation of premium quality hunt waterfowling areas
- Building and rehabilitating blinds in public hunting areas
- Distribution and planting of thousands of pounds of donated corn seed for waterfowl consumption
- Working with the Yakama Tribe in banding upland birds and waterfowl, and building duck "blinds" on tribal lands
- Goose and duck nest counts and banding of both with the WDFW and USFWS
- Working with the WDFW on dove counts & planting WDFW food plots in Eastern WA with WWA owned tractor and farming implements
- Sponsoring of the Annual NW Decoy Collector's Show
- Participating in multiple Sportsman's shows annually
- Donation of funds and volunteer man hours for Swan Mortality Mitigation Studies
- Donation of funds and man hours to WDFW for goose banding and satellite tracking
- Litter pickup projects at public hunting areas, boat ramps, and along highways; and conducting multiple fund raising banquets annually to pay for all of these "hands on" conservation projects.
