

Many of you have found yourselves at home with more time on your hands than you thought imaginable. Now that **COSTCO** has TP back in stock we can focus on other things:


- Helping our neighbors and loved ones;

# Steigerwald Lake National Wildlife Refuge Restoration

This article is about the Steigerwald Lake National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) Restoration Project (SLNWRRP). The US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) and Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) are proponents of the project. The plan is to breech the levee and flood a large portion of the Steigerwald Lake NWR for shallow water salmon habitat and establish a world class bird viewing area and a visitor's center for the Columbia River Gorge on Refuge lands.

The project does not follow the original intent laid out by Congress and the **Corps of Engineers (CoE)** in 1987 for mitigation related to the construction of **North Bonneville Dam.** 

The boundary for **Steigerwald Lake NWR** was established in 1987 near the **Port of Camas** and **Washougal** on the Columbia River and is approximately 1,000 acres. The Refuge's origin is closely tied to the mitigation of impacts that resulted from construction of a second powerhouse at the **Bonneville Lock and Dam** on the Columbia River by the **CoE** between 1974 and 1983.

Construction of the powerhouse and related relocation of the town of **North Bonneville** resulted in the loss of 1,122 acres of habitat on the Washington side of the Columbia River, including developed land (163 acres), pasture (184 acres), wetlands (42 acres), mixed deciduous-coniferous forest (117 acres), maple (118 acres), scattered fir-oak (357 acres), lowland brush (91), and Douglas-fir/short scrub (50 acres). Wetland losses included lakes (12 acres), freshwater marsh (11 acres) and slough (19 acres). This information was from the **Steigerwald Lake National Wildlife Refuge Comprehensive Conservation Plan.** 

Refuge's primary mission of providing winter foraging habitat for migratory waterfowl. "Refuge has been actively managed for wildlife since its establishment in 1987. This management has resulted in a productive and important site for native wildlife species in a region that has been highly altered by humans". [Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) BPA 2019].

Washington Waterfowl Association (WWA) is opposed to implementation of SLNWRRP. Listed below are our issues and concerns on the project:

- A. USFWS is not allowed compensation mitigation on the National Wildlife Refuges under Section 404 of The Clean Water Act & Section 10 of Rivers and Harbor Act.
- B. In general, the lands in the **National Wildlife System** are already targeted for restoration.
- C. The Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) clearly states projects are to avoid impacts to water facilities, municipalities, wildlife, etc. Mitigation is not avoiding impacts.
- D. The federal Endangered Species Act (ESA) states action by a federal agency cannot impact existing endangered or threatened species habitat on proposed projects.
- E. The federal ESA further states birds that migrate between countries that have agreements are to be identified and their habitats maintained to ensure they do not become extinct or threatened by propose projects.
- F. Proponents of the project believe the waterfowl (mainly geese) will find someplace else to go to. This position is inconsistent with either **Act.**
- G. Study on a similar area (proposal to create shallow water habitat) concluded that that area was "high value" waterfowl habitat and "low value" fish habitat. WWA believes this conclusion is also applicable to SLNWRRP.

# **Steigerwald Lake NWR Continued**

- H. A Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) study on a similar area (Shillapoo Wildlife Area) found that it would lead to 65% or as much as 80% less usage by waterfowl in the area during the fall (migrating waterfowl) if the project were built. This is primarily due to the lack of water in the area. A similar effect is predicted by that study for the spring waterfowl migration because the water will be too deep and the waterfowl will not be able to reach the food. In addition, the study showed impacts to 80 other species.
- Following is a quote from the Final EA: "Critical habitat for Lower Columbia River Chinook (LCRC) includes the Columbia River adjacent to the study area but does not include the Refuge lands other than Gibbons Creek." The whole idea of creating shallow water habitat was for LCRC.
- J. Proponents are trading wildlife habitat including waterfowl for fish habitat.
- K. BPA and CoE have completed 60 projects for salmon habitat restoration consisting of 7,000 acres since 2007, yet salmon runs have continued to decline.
- L. The Washington State Legislature opposed implementation of **SLNWRRP** and did not appropriate \$4.6 million for the **state's** share of the project costs, stopping construction in summer of 2018. The proponents negotiated an agreement with the **Washington State Department of Ecology (WDOE)** to provide the \$4.6 million for the project even though the project violates **CWA** and **ESA**.

**WWA** has not found any *pro bono* legal assistance yet to help fight this proposed project, but are hopeful. Proponents expect to begin construction in June 2020.

# **WA Legislative Report**

[Editor's Note: WWA is a voting member of the Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC). WWC is a member organization of the Hunter's Heritage Council (HHC), a Washington State based organization dedicated to political action on behalf of the hunting and related communities of Washington].

As I reported last month, the edited version of the animal-cruelty bill [Senate Bill, SB 6300] passed both chambers and went to the Governor's desk for his signature. Nothing is for sure when it goes to Jay Inslee's desk. When he was in Congress for 10 years, eight out of 10 years he was Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) [not to be confused with your local Humane Society] Legislator of the Year and during his years in Congress he was the absolute worse vote for sportsmen. He is an animal -rights person to the max.

The Governor signed **SB 6300** with no line item vetoes, so he accepted the bill as is. **SB 6300** is now law.

I am very proud of the **Hunters Heritage Council (HHC)** record as a lobby organization. During our 22 years of existence, we have killed every anti-hunting bill introduced, and probably double or triple that before they are even introduced. I will match that record with any lobby organization in Olympia.

This was a crushing blow for the Animal Rights (AR) community. They have always wanted to get some definition to equate animals to people, and in these bills, they tried equating animal pain equal to human pain. With the poorly drafted definitions of pain and suffering in the

original proposed legislation, the use of hunting dogs and other work dogs would have been eliminated. So too many dog training methods would have been banned.

If the bill was killed instead of amended, the AR community would have run an public Initiative next year. The AR people got all their language struck from their bills and instead the bill got a very tightly worded, well drafted and well-written sensible bill. The dreams of the AR community to run an Initiative was blown away.

No businesses or major donors will contribute to an Initiative with the goofy definitions pro-offered by the AR people. They spent millions of dollars for nothing! Nothing makes me happier than seeing the AR groups get blown away in legislative battles.

In this time of COVID-19 with most everyone at home, there is plenty of time to reflect on things. One thing to reflect on is how well that the **WWA** Officers and the Board of Directors are fighting for your hunting rights within the parameters of their 501(c)(3) tax exempt designation, while maintaining fiduciary responsibility. By being a voting member of **Washingtonians for Wildlife Conservation (WWC), who itself is a member of the HHC,** the **WWA** has access to a lobbyist, and I would wager there is no place in this nation where you can access a top-flight registered professional lobbyist at that cost.

In the state legislatures, the cost for good lobbyists start at between \$8,000/month and go to over a million dollars per year. **WWA** is committed to waterfowl in every aspect, conservation, habitat, and waterfowl hunting. Protecting waterfowl hunting means being on the front lines in Olympia and fighting those battles.

# Fishing, shellfish harvesting, and some hunting postponed

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) today announced that recreational fishing, shellfish harvesting and spring turkey and bear hunting seasons will be delayed in an effort to control the spread of COVID-19. The decision follows a Friday announcement that all state land and boat ramp closures would extend to May 4, 2020 to coincide with Governor Jay Inslee's extension of the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order.

WDFW expects most recreation activities to remain closed through the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order. The department will reevaluate specific hunting, fishing, shellfish harvesting, public land, and boat ramp closures as new information becomes available from public health officials. "Local public health authorities have relayed to us their concerns regarding the risk that hunting, fishing and recreational travel poses to their communities right now," said WDFW Director Kelly Susewind. "With the support of the Governor's office we're asking people to put their recreation plans on pause while we work together to get this situation under control."

**Director Susewind** noted that some individuals may be able to enjoy these activities without risky interactions, but many cannot and asks everyone to be patient for the health of all Washingtonians.

These newly extended closures include all recreational fishing and shellfish harvesting, whether on public or private lands, and the spring bear hunts that would have started on April 1 as well as the April 4 and 5 youth turkey hunt. In addition, the department will postpone the spring bear and turkey season opening days, which were previously scheduled to open on April 15. The department made the closure decisions after consulting with local health departments.

While some recreational fishing opportunities exist year-round, the lowland lakes trout season opener, previously scheduled for April 25, is one of the most celebrated angling days of the year. The recreational halibut seasons scheduled to open on April 16 in Marine Areas 6-10 and Areas 1-5 on April 30 will be delayed.

Recreational harvesting of spot shrimp in Marine Areas 5-7 and 12 will also be delayed. When fishing seasons do open, anglers should be prepared to practice proper social distancing and avoid the gatherings that characteristically define opening day for so many.

A number of April razor clam digs are cancelled, though the department will assess the ability for razor clamming and other shellfish seasons to resume in May.

If the department is able to open spring bear and turkey seasons on May 4, spring bear hunters would still have until May 31 or June 15, depending on the location, to use their permits before the intended season closure dates for those hunts. Likewise, spring turkey hunters would have 28 days of hunting during the spring season, plus, most likely, a robust fall season.

Hunting application deadlines for the rest of the year have not changed, yet the deadline for sealing bobcat and river otter pelts that were harvested during the 2019-2020 season has been extended to July 20.

Refunds for licenses and permits, if initiated before opening day, are available. Hunters can also get their points reinstated for spring bear season if requested prior to the start of the season.

The department does not regulate shed antler hunting, yet wants to remind the public that this activity is not allowed on state lands while the closures are in place. # **RRGC Wood Duck Box Program**

Please find pasted below an e-mail ail received yesterday from **Richland Rod & Gun Club** with another Wood Duck Box Camera.

The **WWA** system that we are using will tell us if you opened the e-mail and also if you clicked on and opened the link. From this, we know that these e-mails are of high interest to the WWA Group.

If you are hunkered down at home, this may give you something to watch. If you do not have an interest, please just humor us and delete it. This is a group e-mail and it goes out to all in the system.

We hope you are all well, and please stay safe. Pasted Below:

This hen is 30156 that was originally banded in 2017 down river about a mile. She nested in 2018 in twice in near by boxes and twice in 2019 again in a near by box #494. This year she is in box #393.

We hope to add additional cameras as we locate nesting hens. There is wood duck activity in box #493 and a screech owl in box SM that are close enough that I should be able to set up a switch with multiple boxes on this broadcast channel. Thanks for watching.

We have accomplished performing the annual maintenance of all 474 nesting boxes that were available for wood ducks last nesting season.

We have accomplished performing the annual maintenance of all 474 nesting boxes that were available for wood ducks last nesting season. We have replaced some of those boxes that have reached the end of their life with

boxes built by youth at the Sportsman Show or Kids Duck Day, and by students at Libby Middle School or Homeschool students.

The data collected during the effort shows 56.5 % of boxes were used by wood ducks, 86 boxes were used by Western Screech Owls, cooperative banding with **WDFW** installed 17 new bands on owls and had 24 owls recaptured having been banded in previous years.

There were 186 nest boxes that had successful hatching of ducklings evidenced by us counting 1214 membranes. We believe this number is a very conservative estimate of the actual number of ducklings that were hatched and jumped from the nest boxes. The reason we feel the number is lower than actual is because many membranes are "lost" between the hatch and when the box cleaning is performed months later.

Now that all the boxes are ready for hens, we will start to survey boxes for banding efforts. A few selected checks indicate the early nesting activities have started.

One box checked on 3-22-20 we found and recaptured a hen sitting on 10 eggs. This hen is a banded hen that has returned to this same box or adjacent boxes since 2016 when she was first banded. Additionally we had deployed a geolocator on this hen last year on 4-23-19. Her nest hatched out and jumped from the box on 5-19-19. Apparently the ducklings perished and she re-nested in the same nest box which jumped on 7-15-19. The geolocator has been recovered/removed to download the mini data logger data and we will report on the migration data after the data is processed and analyzed. We are hopeful that we will recover more of the 16 geolocators that were deployed last spring when we get further into the nesting season.

We have 2 channels on YouTube that we are attempting to stream live video. We have had some upload bandwidth problems which drops off our live stream, requiring us to make a field trip to reset the equipment. ## **Need Hunter Ed? Now What?**

Due to the Governor Inslee's direction and the need to help address the spread of COVID-19, the **Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW)** has cancelled all in-person hunter education classes.

So, now what? OPTIONS ARE AVAILABLE!

Briefly if a student is 9 years old or older they can take the On-line course followed by the Virtual Field course and get a license. The Virtual Field course option will go away as soon as we are able to start offering On-line Field Course Evaluations again.

If a student is <u>under</u> 9 years of age they can still take the On-line course but to complete hunter education they will have to take an On-line Field Skills Evaluation with a hunter education instructor when we are able to offer the evaluations again.

#### **Below are the Official Details:**

• Online course: You may take the online hunter education course and a Virtual Field Day. The Virtual Field Day replaces the in-person Field Skills Evaluation during the COVID-19 emergency. This course takes approximately 10 hours to complete, but students can complete it in multiple sittings.

#### Steps:

#### 1. Complete course:

 Register for and complete the online hunter education course at https://www.huntered.com/washington/.

#### 2. Complete course:

 Next, register for and complete the online Virtual Field Day course at <a href="https://www.huntercourse.com/virtualfieldday/">https://www.huntercourse.com/virtualfieldday/</a>.
 (Note, the VFD course completion certificate is NOT VALID for a license purchase).

- 3. Sign your hunter-ed.com certificate
- Upon completing the Virtual Field Day course, please sign into <a href="https://www.huntered.com/washington/">https://www.huntered.com/washington/</a> to print and sign your course completion certificate. This will serve as your official certificate (once signed, is VALID for license purchase).
- 4. You will also receive an orange postcard-type hunter education certificate in the mail at a later date.
- Hunter Education Deferral: You may qualify for the Hunter Education Deferral, which allows a one year, once-in -a-lifetime deferral of hunter education training for individuals new to hunting who are accompanied by an experienced hunter. Note that this is a one-time deferral and is not available if you have taken a deferral in a prior year even if you did not purchase a license. There are other requirements, so please review them at:

https://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/requirements/education/deferral-program.

Applications are submitted and processed via email, which currently takes 1-2 days. Once approved, you can pay for the deferral and purchase a hunting license online or at a license dealer. At this time, please do not send your application through the U.S. Postal Service.

- Enroll in a later course: You may choose to postpone completion of hunter education and enroll in class after the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. Both the traditional classroom course and the online class plus in-person field skills evaluation course will be available.
- If you need assistance, please call 360-902-8111 or email <a href="mailto:huntered@dfw.wa.gov">huntered@dfw.wa.gov</a>. Be aware Hunter Education staff are working remotely and will respond to emails and phone messages as soon as possible.

We apologize for any inconvenience this has caused. We will do everything we can to assist you during this challenging time to help you get outdoors.




